India ranked 142nd by GDP (nominal) and 124th by GDP (PPP) in 2020. From independence in 1947 until 1991, successive governments promoted protectionist economic policies with extensive state intervention and regulation which is characterized as Dirigisme. Since the start of the 21st century, annual average GDP growth has been 6% to 7%, and from 2014 to 2018, India was the world's fastest growing major economy, surpassing China. Historically, India was the largest economy in the world for most of the two millennia from the 1st until 19th century.

Pandemics are large-scale flare-ups of irresistible illness that can enormously increase dreariness and mortality throughout the world and cause critical financial, social and political disturbance. Facts recommends that the probability of pandemics has expanded over the past century since of expanded worldwide travel and integration, urbanization and noteworthy misuse of the common environment. and supported 42.673 million jobs, which is 8.1% of its total employment. According to the WTTC, India has ranked 3rd among 185 countries in terms of travel and tourism's total contribution to GDP in 2018. India's total foreign tourist arrivals (FTAs) stood at 10.9 million and the foreign exchange earnings stood at Rs. 210,971 crore during 2019 with Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh, and Delhi accounting for about 60% of FTAs.

Tourism industry is one the major threatened industry due the COVID-19 pandemic. Club Mahindra had a decrease of 735.413 Million, which is about 29.352%.

The travel restrictions in India for over 80 countries and the international flights being suspended (and domestic flights being operational with restrictions), the Indian domestic travelers and FTAs had witnessed a significant decline during 2020. The sector is staring at a potential job loss of around 38 million, which is around 70 percent of the total workforce.

### Conclusion

The spiralling and pervasive COVID-19 pandemic has distorted the world's thriving economy in unpredictable and ambiguous terms. But it significantly indicated that the current downturn seems primarily different from recessions of the past which had jolted the country's economic order. Whereas the nations, conglomerates, corporations and multinationals continue to understand the magnitude of the pandemic, it is undoubtedly the need of the hour to prepare for a future that is sustainable, structurally more viable for living and working.


